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Why do we need the RDC to study multiracial health?

Understanding privilege

- Higher SES among specific sub-groups, and more integrated social connections
- Higher levels of neighborhood integration

... and disadvantage

- Poor self-rated health occurs among specific subgroups, especially White/Am. Indian and Black/American Indian

Research Questions

- 1. How do multiracial groups compare to single-race groups on self-rated health?
- 2. How much of the difference from their component groups reflects variation in family and neighborhood context?

Data and Sample

National Health Interview Survey (NHIS Restricted)

- Pooled sample of 2001 2011 waves
- Person and Household File
- Restricted detailed race person file (TX-FSRDC)

2000-2010 U.S. Census & ACS

Tract- and CBSA-level data

Sample Selection Criteria (n=572,864)

- Age 19+
- Living in a core based statistical area (CBSA)
- Race provided in person (imputed cases dropped)
- Survey response not in Spanish

Approach


Clustered Logistic Regression Models

- Comparison of multiracial groups vs. component groups
 - e.g., NH Black/White compared to White & Black

DV: Poor/Fair

Individual- and family-level

Demographic factors

 Racial identification, Marital/Cohabitation Status, Age, Sex, U.S. birth

Socioeconomic Status

Education, Income, Unemployment, Health insurance
 Structure of the survey

Sample adult, 10 dummies for survey year

Tract- and CBSA-level

 Tertiles of Racial Dissimilarity, % Minority, Index of tract disadvantage; Density

Conclusion

SRH of multiracial groups do not merely reflect either group

Individuals with a partner of color generally report worse health than those with a White partner or no partner

Neighborhood contexts are important but do not explain health advantages or disadvantages of multiracial groups
