Elizabeth J. "Betchen" Wayland Barber (December 2, 1940--) is a scholar who works at the intersections of historical linguistics, archaeology, paleobiology, art history, and textiles. As a child, Barber developed expert sewing and weaving skills under her mother's tutelage, which informed her understanding of work in the premodern textile industry. As an undergraduate at Bryn Mawr College in the early 1960's, Barber's chief mentor was Dr. Mabel Lang, who taught Barber Linear B and advised her honors thesis on Linear A. Barber provided proofreading assistance for Lang's Pylos tablet publications. For her thesis, Barber worked with Dr. Emmett Bennett (then of University of Wisconsin) and her sister Dr. Ann Peters (then a graduate student at University of Wisconsin, and later of University of Hawaii, Pacific and Asian Linguistics Institute) and used computer indices of the Hagia Triada texts to decipher signs and symbols in Linear A. Barber created the punch-card input (Group 1 Subgroup 1). Two computer tapes – one each of Linear A and Linear B (Series 1 within the above) – were created at the University of Wisconsin's Computer Center (programmed by Murray Fowler's colleague Richard George Wolfe), towards completion of Barber's undergraduate research; these tapes arrived in PASP in the March 2014 accrual. A copy of Barber's Greek Honors Paper (May 1962), "A Computer Analysis of Linear A," is available in the Emmett L. Bennett Offprint Collection (the "B Authors" folder) of PASP.

At Yale University, Barber's doctoral study was supervised by Dr. Sydney Lamb. The printouts (Group 1, Subgroup 2) represent Barber's second round of analysis conducted, continuing the work done with the tapes. Her dissertation, "The Computer-Aided Analysis of Undeciphered Ancient Texts" (1968), describes an analytical procedure for performing initial analyses for later decipherment. Dr. Barber joined the faculty of Occidental College in 1969 where she taught such subjects as basic linguistic structure, language and the brain, historical and archaeological linguistics, Neolithic and Bronze Age Old World archaeology, ancient Greek, and first-year writing. She was made professor emerita in 2007. Barber is the author of several books. These include Archaeological Decipherment: A Handbook (1974), Prehistoric Textiles: The Development of Cloth in the Neolithic and Bronze Ages with Special Reference to the Aegean (1992), Women's Work: The First 20,000 Years; Women, Cloth, and Society in Early Times (1995), The Mummies of Ürümchi (2000), When They Severed Earth from Sky: How the Human Mind Shapes Myth (2006, coauthor with Paul T. Barber) and The Dancing Goddesses: Folklore, Archaeology, and the Origins of European Dance (2013).

At the time of donation of her Linear A archive to PASP (in 2013, in part from reading Margalit Fox's book on Alice Kober), Dr. Barber lived in Pasadena, Calif. Dr. Barber enclosed several copies of her articles on textiles for distribution to Lydia G. Neuman, then a graduate student in the M.S. Textile and Apparel Technology program at UT; the archivist kept a copy for this collection.

The second accrual of this collection was donated by Barber to PASP in March 2014. It consists of the two computer tapes described above, a tape by Murray Fowler and Wolfe of the Etruscan alphabet, and eight books from Barber's personal Mycenaean Library. Of note, Fowler and Wolfe's *Materials for the study of the Etruscan Language* (v.I-II, 1965) detail the creation of the computer tapes.

Scope and Content of the Records

Research notes and data spreadsheets, a book, dissertation, and article photocopies are included in the 34 items that comprise the Elizabeth J. "Betchen" Wayland Barber Collection (1961-2013) of the Program in Aegean Scripts and Prehistory. The bulk of the items reflect Barber's scholarship and early work in Linear A.

The first record group, **Research Material** (7 items), is comprised of two sub-groups.

The first subgroup consists of research materials (2 items) created by Dr. Barber over the course of her undergraduate thesis at Bryn Mawr College, 1961-1962. Included are a wide black data folder (of counts and analysis) and a grey folder containing a typescript photocopy of the analysis, appendices, and Bennett's index.

Within the first subgroup is one series (2 items), consisting of two computer tapes: one each of Linear A and Linear B. These were created at the University of Wisconsin's Computer Center (programmed by Murray Fowler's colleague Richard George Wolfe), towards Barber's undergraduate research.

The second subgroup consists of research materials (2 items) created by Dr. Barber during her doctoral thesis work at Yale University, 1966-1968. Included are two blue folders: one thin and one thick (oversize). The thin blue folder contains duplicate printouts and a code key for non-sign codes. The thick blue folder contains the following computer-generated counts and indices: tablet list, sentence list, monogram "alphabetic," monogram frequency, diagram alphabetic, diagram reverse, diagram frequency, trigram alphabetic, trigram reverse, trigram frequency, context concordances, paradigms, Harris Test for morpheme boundaries, and words.

The third subgroup (1 item) consists of a Memorex computer tape created by Murray Fowler, programmed by Richard George Wolfe, of the Etruscan alphabet. This data is detailed in their *Materials for the study of the Etruscan Language* (1965) (in Group 2, Subgroup 4)

The second record group, **Manuscripts and Publications** (27 items), is comprised of three sub-groups.

The first subgroup consists of Dr. Barber's dissertation (2 items): a hardbound and a paperbound copy.

The second subgroup consists of a hardbound copy (1 item) of her first book, *Archaeological Decipherment* (Princeton, 1974).

The third subgroup consists of journal article photocopies, and Dr. Barber's CV from 2013 (15 items). The articles were copied by the archivist from the originals that Dr. Barber had prepared for Lydia G. Neuman, then a graduate student in the M.S. Textile and Apparel Technology program at UT.

The fourth subgroup consists of Dr. Barber's Mycenaean Library (9 items), materials that she kept under her desk. It contains books by Bennett, Fowler and Wolfe, Vilborg, and proceedings of the 1961 Mycenaean Colloquium at Wingspread (Racine, WI).

Provenance

Dr. Barber donated her archival materials to PASP under the custody of Dr. Thomas G. Palaima in September 2013. A second accrual was received in March 2014 (eight books and three computer tapes).
