

## From the Editor

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In this issue of *Professional Development: The International Journal of Continuing Social Work Education*, Volume 16 Number 1, a collection of contemporary topics of interest to continuing education practitioners is presented. Topics are meant to enhance the understanding of the role of continuing education in social work and the critical importance professional development plays in advancing the field.

The first article in this edition of the journal comes from our colleagues in Canada from the University of Windsor and the University of Calgary. Carter, Matin and Wilson explore the role of promoting professional involvement in developing and maintaining support groups for clients and persons with autism. The article provides insights into the needs of support group participants and the critical implications this work has on professional practice. This article is followed by a paper focused on enhancing social work practice through holistic and mindful self-care practices. Given the interpersonal and professional requirements of social worker and client interactions, social workers, as a group, demonstrate deep levels of empathy and compassion. Self-care and maintenance of appropriate and professional boundaries through thoughtful process is essential. Wisner and Hawkins from Texas State University provide an excellence insight on this area.

Incorporating research findings into practice in the area of trauma-informed care is described and is the key theme presented by Beldwin and Rolf from the University of Nebraska at Omaha. The next article deals with adoption, a critical area of practice. Two researchers, Warrener and Mi-Sung Kim from Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey School of Social Work, present the perspectives of parents and children on the adoption experience. These findings are coupled with both the risk and protective factors related to adoption. Kaiser from The Ohio State University College of Social Work and Kelly at the Universit-

ty of Missouri School of Social Work provide an excellent article on the United States industrial food system. Lastly, the growth of social work practice and education in China is described by Tsui and Pak from The Hong Kong Polytechnic University.

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
