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Success Story in Tarrant County

MHMR of Tarrant County (MHMRTC) is one of the three expansion communities for Texas Project LAUNCH. MHMRTC is utilizing this project to build a strong early childhood system in collaboration with multiple early childhood organizations. It is relatively normal to have difficulty collaborating with multiple and different organizations, trying to meet everyone’s unique goals and needs; however, the relationship between MHMRTC and Everman Independent School District (EISD) is breaking that norm. LAUNCH leaders Stephanie Norton and Laura Kender met with EISD leaders to discuss LAUNCH strategies to meet the needs of their students and families. One of the strategies discussed was Parent Cafés, a parenting education program that engages parents in an informal setting to discuss family resilience and protective factors. Due to the quality of relationships built between MHMRTC and its community, EISD was open to trying a Parent Café to boost their own parent engagement strategies. Thirteen parents attended the first Café and raved about their experiences, resulting in four more being planned for the school year!



Social-Emotional Screening Toolkit

The Social-Emotional Screening Toolkit: Tips and Tools for Early Childhood Programs was published by Brooks Publishing Co. This toolkit assists programs with the implementation and use of the Ages and Stages Questionnaire: Social and Emotional edition (ASQ:SE). The toolkit is packed with useful tips for conducting screenings, scoring the instrument, and sharing results with families. There are even colorful handouts that can be shared with families to foster the discussion about the importance of early childhood social and emotional learning. There are even sample letters to introduce parents to the tool and worksheets to use in a family conference.
