





go unnoticed.


Luncheons



Question Breakdown ————

APP QUESTIONS

Long Answer 1

"In ecosystems, every organism plays a unique role; when one thrives, the whole community benefits." What is your personal 'why' for serving the CNS community, and how does NSC's mission uniquely speak to that purpose? (200 words)

Do you know what NSC is? Can you identify features about it that makes it unique? Why does our mission resonate with you?

Long Answer 2

NSC's work centers on improving the CNS student experience. What is one issue you've observed or learned about within CNS, and how has it affected students? (250 words)

 Can you observe issues within CNS and how they impact students?

Long Answer 3

Reflect on a period of personal growth that has impacted who you are today. How does this insight prepare you to contribute as a leader and advocate in NSC? (250 words)

- What personal experience helped you grow, and how will that growth shape the way you lead and advocate in NSC?
- Avoid resume dumping! Instead, reflect on an experience in depth.

Long Answer 4

Share a passion of yours, whether academic or extracurricular. Why is it meaningful to you? (200 words)

 We want to know more about you! Create a narrative and be able to talk about your passions.

APP QUESTIONS

Short Answer Options

If money didn't matter, what would you do with your life?

Give us your top 5.

You are asked to teach a class on anything you want to. What is the class about and why?

Write about the last thing/person that made you

smile.

How would you want to be remembered?

What are you reading right now?

We are not trying to trick you, be as creative as you want and let us know more about your personality! Think outside of the box for your answers, members can't help you with this one.

FAQ: "Give us your top 5... what?"

Ans: that's the point of the question being there, we want to see your creativity!

APPLICATION DONTS

- Do NOT go over word limit! We will not read it.
- · Avoid talking badly about someone in your life, keep it respectful.
- Avoid the use of AI, we can typically tell...
- Avoid resume dumping, it never answers the question being asked.
- Avoid surface level answers, dig deeper and set yourself apart.
- Avoid copying our mission and committee descriptions straight from our website.
- Avoid spelling your name/eid/email incorrectly, we cannot contact you if that is the case.
- Avoid waiting until the last minute, some applications do not go through if you submit right at 5 PM.

WEAKRESPONSE

Why do you want to join NSC? (200 words)

Ever since I was a kid, I've dreamt of helping people. Throughout my time at UT, I have struggled to find friends and build a community. Walking up and down speedway, no organization caught my attention until I stumbled upon the Natural Science Council. Filled with laughter and happiness, I could immediately tell that is the place I belonged. I have always wanted to be in a place of like-minded individuals that value the same things I do. NSC's mission to serve as a liaison between faculty and students offers me a way of helping my peers that I plan on utilizing. (102 words)

STRONG RESPONSE

What unique identity, perspective, or skill set would you bring to the Natural Sciences Council? How do you foresee this contributing to your time in Council? (250 words)

One of my biggest "why"s this year has come from being a STEM instructor over the summer. Working with minority HISD students who come from environments riddled with issues related to status/relationships and a lack of nurturance for higher education endeavors has driven me to seek ways to support younger students in underserved communities. Being an instructor brought out my passion for connecting with and teaching youth, and I can see myself implementing my experience in STEM education and curriculum planning (e.g. how to create engaging lessons, activities, spaces) with the CI committee's current initiatives.

On the other hand, my experience at "Girl's State" made me realize the importance of establishing a space where genuine, vulnerable, and diverse stories can be uplifted and cherished. The program brought 500 girls around Texas to learn how to strengthen our personal values through debate, legislation, and government. We were challenged to create a space where we could have discourse while supporting each other's individuality within a week of knowing one another, and we achieved that culture of rapport because we kept witnessing how the best ideas and stories were brought out when girls were cheering each other on. I want to be able to bring such spaces to life through NSC like Student Access does because as someone who would never have spoken about stigmatized or less spoken topics before, my spark for speaking my truth was ignited through watching other confident girls do the same in a supportive community. 
