




Problem Engagement Pyramid



- **Content – Accepting the Status Quo**
 - Members who are comfortable with current conditions and assume challenges are inevitable.
 - Example: Students who notice inconveniences but think, “That’s just how it is.”
- **Curious – Asking Questions and Seeking Context**
 - Members who begin to question how systems work and why problems exist.
 - Example: Asking, “Why is advising so limited?” or “How are courses assigned?”
- **Critical – Diagnosing Problems and Root Causes**
 - Members who analyze patterns, identify issues, and clearly define the problem.
 - Example: Recognizing recurring barriers in course access, advising gaps, or resource visibility.
- **Committed – Creating and Acting on Solutions**
 - Members who design solutions, take ownership, and implement change through collaboration and action.
 - Example: Launching initiatives, organizing events, and building partnerships that create measurable impact.

What is Policy?

Main Purpose: It's how we advocate to improve campus policies impacting student life.

Advocacy

At its core, policy:





- **Identifies challenges** faced by students college-wide
- Proposes a **long-term solution**
- Demonstrates **student support** for change

Formal Proposal

On a broader level, policy:

- **Formalizes agreements** with administration
- Establishes a **timeline for implementation**

Who Works on Policy?

There are two main parts of the policy process, each involving different groups of people.



Voting on Policy

- Typically a two-week process carried out by **NSC members**
- Each of **~50 NSC members** represents the voices of about **300 CNS students each**



Writing Policy

- Most legislation is written by NSC
- HOWEVER - writing legislation is **open to all students**, not just NSC members!
- This ensures policy **reflects diverse experiences** and surfaces **issues that may otherwise be overlooked**

Policy Process

Ideation

- Identify a **student issue** you care about
- Use **personal experience, peer conversations, and campus discourse** to spot gaps
- Keep the issue **specific and actionable**
- Confirm it falls within **NSC's scope** (student life & academic affairs)

Research


- Come up with **solutions** by researching **precedents** at UT or other universities
- Assess **student support** for proposed solutions through surveys
- Evaluate **feasibility** by consulting **administration**

Write

- Write **legislation** once you have student and administrative support
- Clearly define the **problem** and those **impacted**
- Detail the **proposed solution** and how it will **address the issue**
- Include **implementation timelines** to guide action

Present

- **Submit legislation** for review once it's complete
- Allow it to be **voted on** by NSC or the relevant body
- Once approved, the policy is **officially passed** and ready for implementation!

Catalyst

Student Spotlights & Stories

- Share personal narratives, interviews, op-eds, and reflections from students across CNS

Idea to Inquiry where writing begins

- Pitch-driven pieces, questions students are wrestling with

Drafts to Revisions the messy middle

- Personal essays, op-eds, adapting interviews and anecdotes
- Annotated drafts and reflections on revisions
- What changed between first draft and final piece
- Goal of your writing

Pubs to Impact article goes live

- Advocacy pieces, poetry, faculty interviews, student stories and highlights
- Reader responses, follow-ups, impact reflection
- Committee discussions and return to drawing board!

- PR committee creates graphics and posts about the event


Past Events
